Income and Poverty

Poverty Status

The Census Bureau determines poverty status for all people except those institutionalized, in military group quarters, in college dormitories, and/or unrelated individuals under 15 years old based on income and poverty guidelines. If the total income of a person's family is less than the threshold appropriate for that family size, that person, as well as every member of his/her family, is considered poor.

Income Distribution

Household income data are derived from the US Census Bureau's 1990 and 2000 census. These data are pre-tax and include all sources of income (e.g., wages/salaries, Social Security, public assistance, etc.). Median household income is that level of income for which half of the households reported a higher income level and half reported a lower income level. These data are not adjusted for inflation.

Food Accessibility

Grocery and Convenience Stores

The number of food retailing establishments with employees are reported by the U.S. Census Bureau's *County Business Patterns*. Grocery stores are firms that retail a general line of food, including fresh fruits and vegetables, fresh and prepared meats, fish and poultry, and frozen and canned goods. Convenience stores offer a limited line of products that generally includes milk, bread, soda and snacks.

Farmers' markets provide Iowans opportunities for fresh produce that is locally produced. Seniors with limited incomes and families who participate in the WIC program are eligible to receive coupons to purchase fresh produce at farmers' markets.

The Iowa Department of Agriculture and Land Stewardship reported 1 farmers' market in Winnebago County in 2003.

Vehicle Accessibility

For those living in small towns and rural areas where public transportation is seldom available, access to a vehicle is important for an active life-style. Most rural residents have a personal car. However, rural households lacking their own vehicle have limited access to grocery stores and other consumer goods. These data on the number of households with no vehicle available are taken from the *U.S. Census Bureau's 2000 census*.

Food-Related Health Issues

Limited household income can hinder access to nutritious foods, which in turn may result in health issues. Data on the percent of the population that is overweight and obese are synthetic estimates based on the Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System (BRFSS) calculated by Iowa's *State Center for Health Statistics*. Overweight is defined as Body Mass Index (BMI) ≥ 25.0 and < 30.0 . Obesity is defined as BMI ≥ 30.0 . The Body Mass Index is a person's body weight in kilograms divided by their height in meters squared. Diabetes is more common among populations with low incomes than those with higher incomes. The diabetes hospitalization figures are for Type II, adult onset diabetes and were provided by the *Iowa Hospital Association*. Rates are per 1,000 people aged 19 or older.

Program Participation

The monthly average number of food stamp and Family Investment Program (FIP) recipients were provided by the *Iowa Department of Human Services*. The numbers for Food Stamp activity are for the fiscal years noted; FIP are for the calendar year. Numbers of students eligible for free and reduced-price school meals were provided by the *Iowa Department of Education*, as were the numbers of students enrolled. The years are the academic years (i.e., 2000 is for the 2000-2001 school year).

Program Eligibility

FOOD STAMP PROGRAM To receive food stamps, households must meet three financial criteria. 1) A household's gross income before taxes in the previous month must be at or below 130 percent of the poverty line. Households headed by someone over the age of 60 are exempt from this test (although they must still pass the net income test). 2) A household must have a net monthly income at or below the poverty line. 3) All net-income-eligible households with assets less than \$2,000 qualify for the program (\$3,000 for households headed by someone over age 60). The value of a vehicle above \$4,650 (in 2003) is also considered an asset unless it is used for work or for the transportation of disabled persons. The value of a home is not considered an asset. Households participating in the Family Investment Program (FIP), or households where all members receive Supplemental Security Income (SSI), are categorically eligible for food stamps and do not have to meet these three tests.

FAMILY INVESTMENT PROGRAM (FIP) Iowa's Family Investment Program provides cash assistance to needy families with dependent children. Eligibility requirements are relatively complex due to the large number of factors involved but include such things as income, resources (e.g., household goods, motor vehicles, etc.), and an interview process. SCHOOL MEALS Children from families with incomes at or below 130 percent of the poverty level are eligible for free lunches and breakfasts. Children from families with incomes between 130 percent and 185 percent of the poverty level are eligible for reduced-price lunches and breakfasts, for which no more than 40 cents may be charged. While virtually all schools offer lunch, a large number of schools do not offer breakfast.
